Featured story: A Victory in the Climate Misinformation Wars

Earlier this year, John*, a scientist and professor, came to CSLDF after his institution had refused to help him. He was part of a volunteer group debunking climate misinformation on social media. Thanks to John's expertise, the group had a climate conspiracy theorist flagged as "false information" on online platforms, which led to a reduced audience. This conspiracy theorist wasn't happy and went after John personally, clearly trying to silence him—suing for defamation and loss of earnings from his ill-gotten income from spreading falsehoods online. Working with CSLDF attorneys, John was victorious and the case was dismissed. We will continue to support John and all other scientists in this vital work.
